New Orleans Precirom Yellow Fever. The following is an extract from a private letter dated New Orleans,

I hope that no idea of epidemic of fever here will keep you away from New Orleans. So far as I can learn neither the city nor the country has ever been so healthy. Out of a total of seventy deaths officially reported for the week, which is between twenty and thirty below the average, some twenty-nine are of persons over sixty years of age. I do not think it is at all probable we shall have an epidemic during the coming summer; there is very little material in the shape of unacclimated persons for it to work upon, but I very much fear that these tales of sickness starting so early will be repeated so often that business may be interrupted on the announcement of the first case of yellow fever, whether there is any sign of its spreading or not. The weather is very pleasant here now; the trees hegin to look green and peach blossoms are showing themselves. But very few strangers are in town and the retail trade is said to be dull.
