OUTLINES.

There are a great many disappointed lobbyists around town, as fat contingencies, reaching in some instances to \$10,000, it is said, had been promised to a number of them."

pany shall permit the loading or unloading of any freight car on the Sabbath day (known as Sunday) within the limits of this State.

Sec. 2. That no railroad company shall permit any car, train of cars, or locomotive, to be run on Sunday on any road within the limits of this State, except such as may be absolutely necessary for the transportation of the U. S. mails, and except in cases of urgent necessity other than for the purposes of business and pleasure: Provided, That the word Sunday, as used in this act, shall be construed to embrace only that part of the day between sunrise and sunset.

Sec. 3. That any railroad company offending against either of the above sections shall be liable to indictment for a misdemeanor in each county in or through which such car, train of cars, or locomotive, shall pass, or on which such freight car shall be loaded or unloaded, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than five hundred dollars for each offence.

Sec. 4. That the fine so imposed shall, when collected, be paid into the public trasury of the State for the use of the public schools of the


