Personal and Bistoric Reminiscences and Associations.

In connection with the death of Mrs. E. King, who arrived here sick from Charleston, S. C., a month ago, and died yesterday morning, it may be of interest to mention the following facts which have come to our knowledge: She is represented as the last of her race, a lady of great purity of character and a devout Christian. great-granddaughter of Wm. Hutt, of Rev. A. McFadyen. Virginia, to whom King George II. granted the charter of the city of Norfolk, Va., in 1736, a family of Norman-French descent D., at 8 P. M. who date back to William the Conqueror. next doer to the N. C. State Depot, and 8 P. M. Hand and Visional her kindness to many of the officers and soldiers of the late Confederate service

She was married at St. George's, Camberwell, England, on the 8th of August, 1841, to Edward, fifth son of the late Mr. Wm. King, of Winterslow Wilts, and whose father, D. H. King, Esq., was an attache to Lord Holland at the Court of Madrid in the last century. (See Napier's Pen. War, 1813.) Her husband is the well known author of "The Naval Sougs of the South," (not yet published in book form,) and written under the nom de plume of "290" in Southern papers during the war. He was also a member of the Lafayette Artillery, of Charleston, S. C., and the "French Benefeciance Society," of the same city. In 1861, Lieut. E. King, 19th Virginia Infantry, was appointed Acting Asst. Quartermaster at Headquarters, as Major, by Gov. Letcher, of Virginia. His sens, then aged respectively fourteen and sixteen, took the field as volunteers in the 1st Va. Regt. After Gettysburg, the elder was appointed to special service under General Whiting, commanding this Department. The younger, for gallant conduct at Bull Run and first Manassas, was appointed a cadet to the Alabama Military Institute, and is known as "The Little Drummer Boy of Manassas."


