WASHINGTON, April 10.-The Senate re-sumed the consideration of the New Hampshire Senatorial case. Mr. Saulsbury ar-gued against the admission of Mr. Bell to the seat.

After a brief discussion the yeas and nays were taken, and Mr. Bell was ad-mitted to a seat in the Senate by a vote of 35 to 28.

The Army bill was brought before the Senate, after which there was an executive session, and the Senate adjourned until tomorrow.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.






