We regret exceedingly to learn of the death of General Richard Taylor, whose recent work we have several times referred in terms of hearty praise. He died in New York, whither he had gone in search of medical aid. He was a brilliant Confederate soldier, and was a writer of unusual elegance, terseness and force. The South can ill spare such men of superior parts and of elevated characters. He was a true Southron, the son of a very distinguished soldier and President of the United States, Gen. Zachary Taylor, a bater of shams, a man of solid merit, and of unsullied honor, a true representative of true chivalry:

The emigration fever is said to have struck the colored people of Virginia. We believe the disease that attacked South Carolina and portions of North Carolina, a year or so ago, known as Liberia among the darkies, did not visit Virginia. To-Day's Indications.

For the South Atlantic States, warmer, clear or partly cloudy weather, variable winds, shifting generally to southerly, folowed by stationary or falling barometer.

There seems to be considerable divergence of opinion in many localities as regards the amount of money a merchant or trader has to pay in order to procure a license to do business. In some counties, Sheriffs and Registers of Deeds demand that 75 cents shall be paid for a business license, and business men dispute it. The best solution of the matter will probably be found by reference to the Revenue Law. Section 28 of that instrument requires license to be taken; section 29 prescribes the form of license, and section 30 fixes the fees at 25 cents to Sheriff and Register each, thus: "No license issued by the Sheriff shall be valid until the same shall have been exhibited to, and countersigned by the Register of Deeds of the county, who shall receive for the services imposed on him by this act in reference to license, a fee of twenty-five cents from every person licensed. And the Sheriff shall be allowed a fee of twenty-five cents for issuing license under this act: Provided, that said fees shall be paid only once a year by merchants and others who make returns to the Register of Deeds semi-annually."

Easter Eggs. As Easter is here the following will be of interest to the coming generation : To color eggs a beautiful crimson buy five cents worth of cochineal; put this in two quarts of water and boil the eggs in it. Another good coloring is legwood. You can also bronze them with common bronze used for shoes. To scratch figures on them use a quill dipped in vinegar. Another way to color them is to sew brightly colored ribbons tightly around the egg, put a teaspoonful of powdered alum in a quart of water and boil the egg in it for an hour or two. If the color is not deep enough, 1epeat the process.
