The colored woman, who seemed to be a victim of too much religious excitement, and a very decent and respectable looking weman withal, collected quite a large crowd by her insane ravings. Her remarkable aptitude in quoting scripture, under the circumstances, was noted by those present. The white woman was very quiet when allowed to have her own way, but rather violent in her expressions when interfered with in any manner.

The two women were subjected to the usual examination by Justices Hall and Wagner, assisted by Drs. W. W. Lane and T. S. Burbank, who pronounced them both to be insane, and recommended that they should be sent to the County Asylum at the Poor House.

The white woman is known by the name of Laura Knight. About three years ago she was apparently in the same condition as now, and was sent to Laurinburg, Richmond county, where she had a sister liv-

The colored woman is named Mary Smith. She was examined as to her mental condition about a month ago, at which time her husband, Pompey Smith, gave assurances of his ability to take care of her.

Promising Boys. On Friday a family of colored people, living in the northeastern portion of the city, sent down town for an officer, stating that a number of boys were brickbatting the house, breaking the windows, &c. Officer John Bryan was dispatched to the locality woman's own children, two boys, aged about eight and ten years, who had been throwing the missiles and injuring the property. The officer said the little scamps. would actually stand by the side of their mother, hurl a brickbat at the house and smash a window without the act being noticed by her, and then pretend that they were anxious to find out who was the guilty party. Nearly every window in the house had been thus demolished, the boys appearing to consider the smashing the rarest kind of sport.
