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TO-BEY'S AMATEURS.

For the South Atlantic States, northeast to southeast winds, falling barometer, slightly warmer, and partly cloudy weather, are the indications for this section to-day.

The race, yesterday-How it resulted.

The number of people at the Fair Grounds, yesterday afternoon, was larger than any assemblage that has gathered there since the last Fair was held, now several years ago. There could not have been less than fifty vehicles on the ground, in many of which were ladies, who seemed as deeply interested in the event as the owners of the competing horses were excited.

The contest on this occasion was between "Katie," a bay mare, and "Billy," a bay horse, the private teams of two young gentlemen of this city, and both known to be quite fast, (the horses we mean). The race was for best two out of three, mile heats, to light sulkeys, and was won by "Katie" in two straight heats-time 2:45 and 2:46 1/2.

For the first heat, a toss for position resulted in the mare's getting the inside track, which she kept until the finish, gradually getting away from the horse and coming in about four lengths ahead in 2:46 1/2. The first half mile of the second heat was as pretty a race as we have ever witnessed, the horses keeping almost neck and neck all the way round, and passing the starting post with Billy a little ahead.

From the interest excited by the first race, we judge that there will be other trials of speed ere long, and more amusement for those who are fond of the sport.
