To-day the Ewing men are claiming that they have turned Dorsheimer's speech in denunciation of Ewing both upon him and those Eastern Democrats whom he represented, when he declared, amid tremendous cheering of the Tilden men at St. Louis, they propose to make a straight issue be-tween soft and hard money; that by that issue they, the Eastern Democrats, intend-ed to stand or fall, and that if the convention wanted soft money they could give their votes to the resolution offered by Gen. Ewing, the most distinguished man is the United States. Recalling this speech, they have been exulting to-day that they have committed the Democratic party of the State of Ohio in advance of the National Convention and the campaign of 1880, to the success of the most distinguished soft smoney man of the Union, denounced as such by the united hard money Democracy of the East only three years ago in National Convention. There is one other national feature of this victory of which they do not hesitate to speak freely among themselves, and that is that they regard the triumph of yesterday as a final victory over Thurman in all his Presidential aspi-

The Stalwarts are so extreme that they are always annoyed, even angered, when they hear conciliatory views fall from representative South erners.
