Sale of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad. We learn from our correspondent at Raleigh that Messrs. Stedman & Latimer, of this city, as the attorneys of the bondholders, have obtained a decree for the foreclosure and sale of this road, at the present term of the Circuit Court of the United States now being held at Raleigh. Major D. J. Devane, of this city, was appointed Commissioner, upon filing a bond for \$50,000, and instructed to deposit the money from the sale of the Road in the Bank of New Hanover, in this city. We are not informed as to what time the sale will take place.
