The Brunswick Case--Decision and Appeal.

In the case of "the people of the State of North Carolina upon the relation of S. P. Swain vs. M. C. Guthrie," being a quo warranto to test the validity of the title of the defendant to the office of Superior Court Clerk of Brunswick county, heard in the Superior Court of New Hanover on Wednesday, His Honor, Judge Seymour, rendered a decision yesterday in favor of the complainant, the defendant being required to surrender the office and its appurtenances to the plaintiff and pay a fine of \$250 and the costs of the action.

From this judgment plaintiff appeals to the Supreme Court, and is required to give bond in the sum of \$50 for his appearance.

The Register of Deeds issued nine marriage licenses during the past week, of which two were for white and seven for colored couples.

Up to the time of closing the books yesterday afternoon only 1,533 persons had listed their taxes, being less than half that are liable, and only eight days left in which to complete the list.

A horse attached to a dray started to run away on Water street yesterday afternoon, but finally stopped by his own accord, without causing any damage. It was one of the most decided failures in the shape of a runaway we ever saw.
