A correspondent represents him to be of ginger-cake color, weighing one hundred and forty pounds, aged 23 years, with no whiskers, except, perhaps, a very thin moustache, and being about 5 feet 10 or 11 inches in height. There is an effort being made to have the Governor issue his proclamation, offering a reward for his arrest. The statement that the murderer's name was David Faison was incorrect.
