"The general impression produced among thinking Republicans by all that was done in Saratoga is one of disappointment. There was a great opportunity to create courage and reasten enthusiasm, but the opportunity was missed."

It is interesting to know how New York politicians regard Cornell's candidacy. It is generally held that it finishes Sherman's prospects, and that Grant is the man. We know of no more correct and intelligent correspondent than the New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger. What he says is worth considering. We quote from his letter of the 4th inst:

""Whatever else is uncertain, said Col-lector Arthur this morning there can be no mistake about one thing, and that is, it kills Sherman as dead as Casar. Sherman is cunning, and a good manipulator, but he cannot get on without New York." Gen. Arthur is a pretty shrewd observer of men and things, and, what is more, there are a good many squally astute politicians who are isclined to concur with him. With the Secretary of the Treasury thus summarily Secretary of the Treasury thus summarily disposed of, there is but one other man who is regarded as the controlling destiny, (the phrase is Senator Conkling's, not mine), and he is announced by the telegraph this morning, as on his way from Asia. Apparently it makes not a particle of difference whether General Grant declines or re-declines, Republican politicians and people heresbout appear pre-determined to settle his re-nomination for themselves, and see if they cannot send him back to Washsee if they cannot send him back to Washington by a sort of "spontaneous combus-tion" movement, such as bore General Zschary Taylor to the White House, against his expressed wishes, a good many years ago. These notions now may be all very absurd, but as they have got strangely mixed up with everything that is said as the effect of the Conkling-Cornell boom, your correspondent, as a chronicler of passing events, cannot escape taking cogizance of them."

The ticket nominated at Saratogs by the Republicans gives great dissatisfaction. It is a disappointing, it seems, all around. Conkling beat Hayes and captured the body, and thereby secured the nomination of his men, but it is acknowledged by the Republicans generally that it is a poor ticket, without any special strength. The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, of the date of 4th instant, says of the talk over the nomination:

"The New York Republicans here say that the ticket placed in nomination by the New York Republican Convention yesterday is weak from the head down. Cornell, the candidate for Governor, they say, has not one element of strength, except that he is the regular nominee, and that is a good deal with political parties. Hoskins, the candidate for Liceleast Governor, was a member of Congress for two terms, and when he ran for a third term he was badly besten, although his was one of the strongwhen he ran for a third term he was badly beaten, although his was one of the strongest Republican Districts in the State. Hame ilton Ward, the candidate for Attorney General, was in Congress for two terms, but while there never gave the slightest evidence of possessing more than ordinary ability. The whole ticket, they say, is made up of what is known as machine politicians, and they cannot comprehend how it can be successful, unless the Democracy place in the field a ticket equally as commonplace."

Carrying Concealed Weapons.
