Much Ade About Nothing." Considerable excitement was created in the city last evening by the arrival of Charles Galloway, a well known colored man in the employ of Mr. Z. Latimer, who reported that while riding up from the sound on horseback he had been stopped by two men, at a point near the mineral spring, at about 71 o'clock, but, thanks to the speed of the horse and his cries of murder! help! &c. he had escaped with his money and his life. Of course the Sounders were considerably exercised about the occurrence; the more so since two young white men had reported a similar experience on last Wednesday night, and the event was widely discussed and generally credited.

Later news from a gentleman who was on his way to the sound when the affair occurred, and who saw Charles at the tollgate, places the affair in another light. Our informant states that he and a friend were riding along very quietly until they were in about 150 yards of the Mineral Spring bridge, when suddenly they heard loud and repeated cries just around the bend of the road, and the clatter of a horse's feet as if coming very rapidly. Supposing it to be a run-away, they drove to the side of the road, by which time they distinguished horse and rider—the former at a 2:40 gait and the latter yelling help! murder! help! murder! at every breath. So quickly did the horse pass, and so frightened was his rider, that the buggy was not noticed at all, and the occupants deemed it prudent to return to the Toll House to ascertain what was the matter. The story was soon related, upon which the keeper of the Toll House was asked if he had any fire arms, and replying that he had an old musket, was asked to lend it. His wife vetoed this motion, however, very emphatically, stating that if that musket was loaned she would leave the house, as she had no idea of being without a gun with all those doings around.
