He has acknowledged that he is empleyed by, and is working for, a Northern railway company, and this morning issued a proclamation, further, as 'agent of the Emigration Society,' to all who desired to go to Indiana to be ready by the 15th inst, when an excursion train will be run at the reduced rate of \$16.85 per through ticket. The prominent citizens of both parties have lost their power and influence over the blacks, who are so deeply infatuated that they think all who have advised them not to go do not do so from sympathy, but are paid for such labor or are actuated by interested motives."
