RALEIGH, N. C., February 21. The Council of State met to-day at 10 o'clock. Present: Dr. J. M. Worth, Treasurer, Chairman of the Council; Col. gether in English, morning and evening. W. L. Jarvis, Governor of North Carolina, in the exercise of the power conferred upon me by the Constitution, do issue this my Proclamation, convening the General Assembly in extra session on Mon-day, the fifteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty, on which day, at twelve o'clock, meridian, the Senators and Members of the House of Representaives of the General Assembly of North Carolina are hereby notified and requested to meet in their respective Halls in the Capitol, in the City of Raleigh, for the purpose of considering a proposition for the purchase of the State's interest in, and the completion of, the Western North Carolina Railroad to Ducktown and Paint Rock, made by W. J. Best, J. N. Tappan, W. R. Grace and James D. Fish, of the City of New York, of whose financial responsibility and personal integrity I have satisfactory assurances, and for considering such other pro-positions as may be made for the same

purpose.
In Wilness Whereof, I. Thomas J. Jarvis,
