SUBSTITUTE FOR THE BILL FOR THE SALE OF THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA RAIL-

The General Assembly of North Carolina do

Section 1. That the Governor, Treasurer, Secretary of State, and Attorney General of the State of North Carolina be, and they are hereby appointed Commissioners on the part of said State to sell, assign and transrer all of the interest of the State in and to the stock, property and franchises of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, at public auction, to the highest bidder or bidders, for cash, at a place to be designated by said Commissioners, after first having advertised the same for three months in one or more of the leading newspapers in the cities of Raleigh, New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Baltimore, St. Louis,

Chicago and Bostos. Sec. 2. That no bid shall be entertained by said Commissioners for a sum less than Five Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars Sec. 3. That the said Commissioners are hereby granted full and ample powers to

make all and every stipulation with the highest bidder or bidders, for the transfer of the Western North Carolina Railroad, and everything appertaining thereto, and for the time of completion of said Road, and for the employment of the State's surplus convicts, and for the payment of the bonded debt of said Road, and for every other condition which they may deem necessary for the protection of the interest of the State of North Carolina.

Sec. 4. That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are hereby re-Sec. 5. This Act shall be in force from and after its ratification.
