INCENDIABISM. The Fire Yesterday Morning.

Yesterday morning, shortly after o'clock, fire was discovered issuing from teller tendered him by the People's National the residence of Mr. Herman Hintze, on Market, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets. The alarm was given, but the party starting it had to run to the corner of Market and Seventh streets to reach a telephone box. In the meantime the flames had spread rapidly, having communicated to the store, with dwelling above, owned by Messrs. Adrian & Vollers, and occupied on the second floor by Dr. T. B. Carr, the store being untenanted. The fire department arrived promptly on the some of the neighboring buildings. The

two buildings first alluded to were totally consumed, scarcely a vestige being left besides the brick foundation and chimneys. The fire was first discovered by Mr. Veaney, residing on the opposite side of the street, who shouted fire and then hurried to arouse the occupants of Mr. Hintze's building, consisting of his children and their nurse. Mr. Hintze himself being absent. The door of the room occupied by the nurse and the smaller children had to be burst open, and they narrowly escaped with their lives. Fire had been set to the house, no doubt, and it was apparently placed in such a position as to cut off the escape of the nurse and children from their room which was on the second floor of an addition to the main building, the lower floor being used as a dining room. The villains had placed three barrels filled with combustible material on a line with the division between the main building and the addition. But for the prompt discovery of the fire by Mr. Veaney the children and nurse, Ellen Smith, would no doubt have perished in the flames. As it was, they escaped with nothing but what they had on their backs, the entire contents of the building, with the exception or a few articles of parlor furniture being consumed. Mr. Hintze lost, besides his furniture, all of his late wife's jewelry, all of his books

Dr. Carr, with the assistance of friends, including members of the fire department, succeeded in saving about all of his furniture, a small portion of it, however, being in a damaged condition.

Dr. Carr's loss on furniture was covered by insurance in the Wilmington Mutual, represented by Mr. S. N. Cannon.

Since writing the above we learn that Mrs. Von der Leidts, a German lady, employed as housekeeper by Mr. Hintze, lost about \$200 in clothing and furniture, upon which there was no insurance. The nurse also lost her clothing and effects.

Not an Affray."

Champion Alligator.

There was a huge alligator on exhibition at the head of the old market house yesterday afternoon.
