of this body has been suddenly taken from the scene of his labor and usefulness, we, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of Wilmington, deeply mourning the loss sustained by us and the community at large in the death of Col. H. G. Flanner, desire to place upon our records a faint testimonial of the high regard in which the deceased was held in his official capacity as an Alderman of the city, and as a citi-zen of this community. Taken from our midst in the full vigor of his manhood and in the greatest activity of his mental and social endowments, the Divine decree which deprived the public of a faithful and efficient servant, society of a generous, genial companion and friend, and an afflicted family of a continual reliance and comfort, falls upon us with appalling suddenness, and leaves us in consternation at ts fatal effects.

Resolved, therefore, That we, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of Wilmington, deeply sympathize with the family and friends of the deceased in their sudden bereavement.

On motion of Alderman Myers the Board then adjourned in respect to the memory of the deceased without transacting any further business.

Munson, on the part of St. John's Lodge No. 1, and Gen. M. P. Taylor, W. H. Northrop, George Harriss and W. H. Chadbourn, on the part of Wilmington Lodge No. 319.

The funeral ceremonies at the Cemeter were very impressive, being conducted principally by the Masonic fraternity, who had charge of the remains.
