Session. The Board of Aldermen met in adjourned session yesterday afternoon, at 4 o'clock p. m.; present, His Honor, Mayor S. H. Fishblate, and Aldermen Myers, Bowden, VonGlahn, Vollers, Foster, King, Lowrey and Hill.

The Mayor stated that he had called the Board together subject to adjournment, and on motion the reading of the minutes was dispensed with and the General Tax Ordinance was taken up and passed. | The rate of taxation on real and personal property is 14 per cent., being the same as last year.] Alderman Foster offered a resolution to appoint a committee on city fire insur-

Alderman Foster moved that the Mayor advertise for bids from competent persons to make up the tax book and deliver the same complete to the city clerk.

Alderman Foster moved that the cattle ordinance be amended so as to limit the enforcement of the same to the territory bounded by Red Cross, Seventh and Castle streets and the river. Adopted.

Alderman King offered the following resolution, which provoked a long discussion, Aldermen Myers and King favoring, and Aldermen Bowden and Foster opposing its adoption:

WHEREAS, In justice to the Wilmington Market Company, who have erected a handsome and airy market, with the necessary sheds for the protection of the market carts, both vegetable and fish, and as they propose to grant to said carts the necessary rotection free of cost to them, and as the hucksters now occupying the sidewalks are encumbering the passage of travel on said streets, and also in justice and for the protection of the butchers of the city who have or will occupy stalls in said new market house

Resolved, That the Mayor be instructed to have the market carts, including fish carts and hucksters, removed at once between Dock, Orange and Front streets, and Red Cross and Fourth streets and the Railroad Bridge, provided the same can be done in accordance with law.
