Mr. Bradlaugh has been served with a writ at the suit of Henry L. Clark, claiming \$500 for affirming and clearing taking his seat. Small pox is raging at Christiansburg. General Hancock and Mr. Tilden have had a long private interview. The total immigration from Europe to the port of New York for May was 42,026.

Among those who received Bachelor of Arts at Harvard Commencement was W. F. Price, Lumberton, N. C. The total gold coinage for the first six months of 1880 is \$56,157,925; silver, \$27,943,437.50; minor coins, \$267,745.50.

We get these facts from Mr. Hale's New York letter to the Raleigh News. We take occasion to enter our most earnest protest thus early. It is beginning to be talked that Garfield will have to withdraw. We really hope that no such calamity will befall the Democratic party. He is already beaten, and if he should be forced off the track and another horse put on we should have the race to run over from the start. The following dispatch from Washington to the New York Sun gives a hint of the talk about Garfield: "Noted Republicans at Washington, whose names would excite surprise if given to the public, advocate the policy of withdrawing Garfield, and substituting another candidate whose record is not tainted with reality and dishonor. They think the party is not strong enough to carry such a load, and that the best statesmen in the face of the world are being sacrificed to a mere man of straw, who is being advanced to a position of honor and power by the friends of more than one of the aspirants who were defeated at Chicago."

Mr. John G. King, one of Louisiana's most esteemed and aged citizens, is dead, in his 73d year. The Raleigh young men have formed a Hancock and Jarvis Club, with George M. Snodgrass as President.

A storm passed over Louisiana and vicinity on Tuesday last, blowing down trees and fences and damaging the fruit. In looking over the State exchanges the last two days we think we have met with twenty-five uncredited items taken from the STAR. Tute fair.

Southern Home: The first actual survey of the State of North Carolina, accompanied with a map, was made by Jonathan Price and John Strother, in 1808. Thus far the census man has not reported a single negro in the State as being over 150 years old. There must be some mistake and the records should be revised.

Henderson Review: In attempting, a few days ago, to arrest a colored man named Winfield, constable Phelps was struck by him with a stone and so seriously injured as to be confined to his room. Almondean Gleason: On last Monday, William Coble was arrested on a charge of resisting a census enumerator in the discharge of his duty, and was bound over to answer at the next term of the Federal Court.

Col. W. R. Myers was re-elected President, and J. J. Gurney, Superintendent, Secretary and Treasurer of the Atlantic, Tennessee & Ohio Railroad, by the stockholders at their meeting held at Charlotte on the 1st inst.

Wilson Advocate: We have never undertaken to lecture our brethren of the Democratic press, with the view of what they have seen fit to pursue with respect to the nomination of Gov. Jarvis or any other Democratic candidate. Louisville Times: Last Saturday being the day appointed by John Williamson for a meeting, between fifty and all the prominent ladies of the city, at the Court House. General B. B. Ashville Citizen: Prof. Wm. Cain has been for the past three weeks engaged in surveying the route from this point to Pigeon river, with the view of locating positively the line of the Western North Carolina Railroad; and Col. Thad. Coleman has been at the same time going over the line down the French Broad.

Oxford Torchlight: A meeting of the stockholders of the Oxford and Henderson Railroad and other parties interested was held last Tuesday. It was stated that the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad Company would complete the road at once, provided the stockholders would turn over to them the road bed of the Oxford & Henderson Railroad, free from all liabilities, together with the assets now on hand.

A party has already been made up in Statesville to go on to Washington in March next to see Hancock inaugurated. Charlotte Observer: There is much complaint along the line of the Western North Carolina Railroad against the night schedule. Railroad companies should certainly be the friends of the stock law, with the law in operation in the two counties through which the Atlantic, Tennessee & Ohio Railroad runs. That road paid during the year only \$16,500 in live stock killed. The Cheraw & Chester Railroad has gotten old enough and strong enough to run excursions. There is to be a big one to Chester next Saturday.

Raleigh Observer: From nearly all parts of the State come the news of destruction by storms, lightning and hail. A gentleman who came up from New Berne yesterday said that the hail had played havoc with the cotton and corn in the fields around Kinston. The crops on the fine farm of Mr. Farrot were almost totally destroyed. The vacancy on the Committee, owing to the declension of Captain S. P. Ashe, was filled by the election of C. M. Lemmie, Esq.

Warrenton Gazette: Malissa Somerville, a colored girl, smothered her infant last night or this morning. We were pleased to see in our office this week, our old young friend, Mr. Austin Cheek, son of the late Mr. Elbert Cheek, who left Warren some twelve years ago for Kentucky. While doing well himself, he does not advise any one to leave the Old North State. He is now in the employ of the railroad fare detour many pleasure seekers from more than one or two trips during the summer. In 1870 Kinston had 1,100 inhabitants. Since then the corporate limits have been reduced for political purposes, and the town proper numbers 1,817 with 500 on the suburbs, showing an increase of about 60 per cent. in population.

Two families on the Coast of North Carolina in a condition of starvation. Intelligence was received at the Signal Office in this city yesterday to the effect that two families on Bogue Point, on the north side of Bogue Inlet, about thirty-five miles south of Fort Macon, are in an actual state of starvation. The famine-stricken persons consist of George Gillilan, wife and six children, and Ford Lewis, wife and two children. Their discovery was made in this wise: Mr. Corbett, formerly stationed at Sloop Point, below this city, but now in charge of the office at Fort Macon, being off on a tour of inspection of his wire, and being in search of a boat in which to cross Bogue Inlet, accidentally came across the families in a fish camp on one of the lonely banks remote from the channel of travel and almost of casual resort. Both families were down with bilious fever, with only one in all their number able to sit up or be of the least assistance to the remainder of them, being without money, or provisions, or the means of getting them, and none of their number being able to go over to the mainland for help. When Mr. Corbett arrived they had not had a mouthful of anything to eat in three days, and were actually on the verge of starvation, besides being worn out with sickness and want of rest. Mr. Corbett had a pocket instrument with him, by means of which he succeeded in transmitting the information of the destitute families to the office here, and we learn that a telegram has been forwarded to Morehead City, so that help may speedily reach those sorely afflicted people.

We are indebted to Mr. Watson, in charge of the Signal Office here, for the above information. Mayor's Court. Mary Eliza Lively, colored, charged with being tipsy and acting very disorderly on the public streets between 11 and 12 o'clock Thursday night, and also with cursing and abusing and resisting a police officer, was ordered below for thirty days for the former and thirty days for the latter offence, the prisoner to be confined for the present in a dark cell, in consideration of some threatening remarks she made as judgment was being pronounced in her case.

During the session of the Court information was telephoned of a disturbance in the neighborhood of Sixth and Walnut streets, when Sergeant Davis was instructed to go and investigate the matter. He soon returned with one Lucy Fisher, colored, and her case was immediately called. She was charged with acting in a very boisterous manner, to the great annoyance of the neighborhood. One of the witnesses testified that she was not only using her tongue to great advantage, so to speak, but that she was hurling pots, kettles and other utensils about in a most indiscriminate manner, and also flourished an axe and threatened to hurt somebody with it. Her defence of her conduct was both sad and amusing, making the impression on more than one present that she was partly demented. She was ordered to pay a fine of \$10 or go below for ten days.

Increased Mail Service. There has been quite an increase in the mail service here recently. There are now two mails per week between Wilmington and Onslow C. H. and intermediate points, instead of one, as formerly; two between Easy Hill, Town Creek and Shallotte and Wilmington, instead of one, with an additional one between Wilmington and Little River, S. C., and three between Wilmington and Black River Chapel, instead of two, as formerly.
