Determined Attempt at Suicide. Mr. William McLaughlin, of Robeson county, who has been in the employ of the Wheeler & Wilson Sewing Machine Company in this city for some time past, attempted to commit suicide last night while suffering from depression of spirits. About 9 o'clock he purchased an ounce and a half of laudanum at a drug store, and repairing to his room over the office of the Sewing Machine Company, on Princess street, swallowed the whole quantity before it could be prevented by a friend who was present. Physicians were at once called in but he resisted every attempt to apply the proper remedies until from the effects of the narcotic he was powerless and unconscious. Every effort was made to arouse him and counteract the effect of the drug by the physicians and a large number of friends in attendance; but at a late hour last night his case was thought to be very critical indeed.
