Gen. Hancock says the report about the \$250,000 offer is a fabrication from beginning to end. The lie originated with a New York Democratic paper.

Gov. Jeter, of South Carolina, has directed Attorney General Youmans to represent the State in the approaching trial of Col. Cash for killing Col. Shannon.

Even the Radical Washington Republican indulges in a small joke at Blaine:

"Blaine was very tight when he sent his dispatch to Vermont. He had no dress parade in Maine. It was much nearer a fist fight."

Gen. Plaisted was in the war. He is a lawyer and is 52 years of age. He was born in New Hampshire and has been Attorney-General of Maine. Elected by the people as Governor he was counted out by Blaine's Bull-dozing Board.

Georgia elects a Legislature and State officers on October 6th. Indiana on October 12th elects Legislature, State officers and members of the United States House. Ohio votes on same day and elects a Legislature, members of the United States House and minor State officers. West Virginia votes on same day, and elects a Legislature, State officers and members of the United States House. All the Legislatures save Ohio will choose one United States Senator.

The present House of Representatives has five majority only. This shows how important it is that the Democrats not only should hold their own but make gains. Already the Republicans have gained one. It will be a shame if Hancock should be handicapped at the start with a Radical House. The Washington Post thinks the Democrats will gain thirty-seven and lose but five. We will be glad to find so favorable a result after the elections. It is a too sanguine view, we feel almost certain.

In a recent conversation reported in the Louisville Courier-Journal as occurring at North Vernon, Indiana, on Tuesday last, a young Radical lawyer named Olcott said that they (the Rads) "had got about all the niggers they wanted and they were going to vote 'em." One Rowan said that their "intention was to get all of their doubtful men in in the morning; that they intended to have three Deputy Marshals at the polls, and in the afternoon they intended to arrest several of the Democratic voters who hadn't good backing, in order to scare others out and keep as many others as possible from voting."

It was ascertained that seventy-five men imported from Cincinnati were to work on the "road between Vernon and Greensburg for Horace Scott until after the election, their labor to cost him only their board while so engaged." And this is the way the Democrats of Indiana are to be cheated out of the election, if it be possible.

THE STATE CAMPAIGN.

The Senatorial Convention of Richmond and Montgomery counties selected Mr. James M. LeGrand, of Rockingham, as the Democratic candidate for the Senate.

Dr. J. M. Worth goes to Concord on Tuesday to speak. Dr. J. J. Mott, of Statesville, is in the city. Several of the Republican leaders are now gathered here. Raleigh News and Observer.

Gov. Jarvis has been in Watauga, Ashe and Wilkes, and his reception in these counties, we learn, has been of the most cordial, enthusiastic and gratifying nature. He speaks at Taylorsville, Alexander county, today. Charlotte Observer.

There is a bolt among the Wake Radicals. East Raleigh Garfield, Buxton and Bledsoe Club, numbering 380 members, protest against the nomination of J. N. Bunting, white, and Stewart Ellison, colored, for the House of Representatives, and pledge themselves not to vote for them.

We learn that Capt. Buxton and his lieutenant, A. G. Moore, were on a still-hunt up at Clinton on last Thursday. E. W. Kerr, Esq., met them very effectually. That night, at or about 8 o'clock, they orated to a handful of colored people who had been gotten together for the occasion. Warsaw Brief Mention.

We see by the last issue of the Beacon that Col. Winston has decided to enter the race for Congress in this district as the candidate of the Greenbackers. It seems from the correspondence published that he hesitated to announce himself until appealed to so to do by a committee of three Greenbackers from this place. Greensboro Patriot.

Governor Jarvis speaks to-day at Wilkesboro, and Judge Buxton, it is said, has slipped up to Person county. The Judge is getting bolder. He is going within a hundred miles of Jarvis. Mr. Thomas G. Skinner, the Democratic nominee for the lower branch of the Legislature from Perquimans county, is a young lawyer and of unblemished character. Raleigh News and Observer.

We understand that the Republicans will have Judge Buxton in Concord about the 23d, to make them a speech. There is a split in our party this year, but it is a direct result of the '78 outrage. Its coming was foreseen and no power could ward it off. It is now regretted that the ticket was bolted in 1878, and those who were the leaders in the bolting movement then must suffer the consequences now. Concord Sun.

Hon. W. T. Dortch will address the people of the Nabunta, Great Swamp and Pikeville section at Fremont on Saturday next. "Capping" Ralph P. Buxton made his appearance in this town on Tuesday last. The meeting was a complete failure. The audience numbered less than two hundred, and a goodly number of these were either Democrats who had not learned that a division of time with Mr. Dortch had been declined, or were attracted there by idle curiosity. THE MARKET QUESTION—A Ripple of Excitement.

A little stir in market circles was caused yesterday by the fact that some of the butchers took possession of certain stalls in the old market house during the forenoon and commenced selling beef. This was deemed by the authorities as a violation of an order passed by the Board of Aldermen vacating the old market house, and, after consultation, the Chief of Police was directed by Acting Mayor Bowden to notify the parties that they must stop selling meats or other marketable articles in the old market house. At 3 P. M. the parties vacated in two hours. A little after 4 P. M. one of the butchers was found at his post selling beef, and he was thereupon arrested by Chief Brock and taken before Acting Mayor Bowden, at the City Hall, who bound him over in his own recognizance for his appearance before the City Court Monday morning. He was thereupon released, but an officer was dispatched to the old market house to guard the same, with instructions to arrest any one caught in the act of selling beef, etc., from any of the stalls; and pretty soon the same butcher was again arrested and marched up to the City Hall for violating the order. He was a second time recognized for his appearance and then discharged, when it was resolved by the butchers, we learn, not to push the matter any further, the step being taken by them, we understand, with the view of testing the right of the city to keep them from using the old market house. Acting Mayor Bowden, who, it is well known, has from the first antagonized the new market scheme, nevertheless feels himself called upon, in the absence of Mayor Fishback, to enforce the law of the city with regard to the old market house as its now stands.
