The Hon. Wm. A. Robbins, of Statesville, spoke from the portice of the Western Union telegraph office last night to a large orowd, and most agreeably entertained and instructed them on the issues of the existing campaign. THE STORM.

The Effects of the Gale at Smithville and the Sounds. The gale of Friday night, which was quite heavy liere, was much more severe at Masonboro' Sound and other localities in that section. Quite a number of trees were blown down and gangways and fences carried away; and some of the boats and cances also broke from their moorings and drifted off. Two immense trees in one lot, which had withstood many very heavy blows, succumbed to the fury of the blast and were uprooted and dashed to the ground. Our informant states that the gale was at its highest about 11 o'clock, and that for a brief space the wind appeared to him to blow as hard as he had ever known it, and some very heavy storms have come under his observation. The hogs and cattle suffered no particular nconvenience from the storm.

The gale was also exceedingly severe at Smithville, as we learn from Capt. Edgar Williams, who rede out the storm in the harbor. The damage, however, was not as serious as was at one time feared. Morse's wharf, and Fremont's, Holmes' and Harper's bath houses were washed away, and one pilot boat, the Mystery, was dragged ashore, which was about the extent of the damage.
