[N. Y. Financial Chronicle.] Friday, P. M., Oct. 8, 1880 .-The movement of the crop, as indicated by our telegrams from the South to-night, is given below. For the week ending this evening, (Oct. 8), the total receipts have reached 199,094 bales, against 172,221 bales last week, 136,413 bales the previous week, and 102,695 bales three weeks since; making the total receipts since the 1st of September, 1880, 692,758 bales, against 580,347 bales for the same period of 1879, showing an increase since September 1, 1880, of 112,411 bales.

The exports for the week ending this evening reach a total of 132,009 bales, of which 108,500 were to Great Britain, 9,555 to France, and 13,954 to rest of the Continent, while the stocks as made up this evening are now 358,-081 bales.

From the foregoing statement it will be seen that, compared with the corresponding week of last season, there is an increase in the exports this week of 14,262 bales, while the stocks to-night are 38,107 bales more than they were at this time a year




