RAILROAD IMPROVEMENTS.

New Car Shops and stound Bouse for the Wilmington & Welden Ratiroadens atten lett in 16 um

Some months since the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad Company purchased the property just north of the railroad. bounded on the north by Hanover street. on the east by Third street, and reaching nearly to Becond street, from which the dwellings and other buildings formerly occupying the site have been removed, and where there are now in process of erection two large buildings for the use of the company and to take the place of the old ones which were found to be no longer adequate for the purposes for which they had been constructed. One of these, known as the Construction Shop, is rapidily approaching completion and is now receiving the roof. In dimensions it is 140 by 70 feet, is built of brick with a foundation of rock, and will be provided with seven tracks, holding at one time seven passenger coaches or lourteen box cars. Here all the constructing and repairing will be done, so far as relates to the wood work. The roof is on the Mansard plan and will be covered with

Another building, just west of the above, work upon which has just been commenced, will be used as a preparatory department, where all the framing and dressing will be done preparatory to being put together and made into cars and coaches in the Construction Department, and where they will receive their finishing touches. This will also be built of brick and in about the same style as the building first mentioned. Its dimensions will be 140x58 feet, being only a little narrower than the other building.

A new round house for engines will be erected on the site of the old car shops. It will be of brick, with an iron roof, and seme idea may be formed of its dimensions when we state that there will be a space of one hundred and fifty feet between the centre of the turn-table and the outer wall, and that the outside circumference will be three hundred and sixty and the inside circumference two hundred feet. It will contain eighteen engine stalls, each sixtysix feet deep.

The wood work of the shops and round house is under the superintendence of Mr. C. R. Clowe, master carpenter in the railroad shops, and Capt. R. S. Radeliffe has the contract for the brick work. There are quite a number of workmen, both brick masous and carpenters, employed int gether it presents a busy scene of activity which is encouraging to behold.

Mr. Clowe informs us that it is proposed to get to work in the construction department next month, if nothing happens to delay the work, and it will not be long thereafter before the other shop will be ready for occupancy. The buildings are evidently being erected

with an eye to strength and durability, and when completed, will be a great improvement on the old structures, especially in the additional facilities which they will afford to the company for repairing and constructing cars, and doing other necessary work.

These, with the beautiful fron bridge recently constructed over the tracks on Front street, give evidence of a determination on the part of the company to keep up with the steady progress of the times in everything that pertains to improvement in railroad matters.
