THE GARFIELD-HORRY LETTER. REPUBLICANS TRYING TO FIX THE RESPONSIBILITY—ARREST OF A BROOKLYN EDITOR ON THE CHARGE OF FORGERY.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) NEW YORK, October 27.—Kenneth Philip, a journalist, was arrested in Brooklyn today on the charge of forgery, in connection with the Garfield-Horry letter. He will be arraigned in the Supreme Court this afternoon. His counsel has already applied for his discharge on habeas corpus.

LATER—Philip was arrested in the lobby of the Park Theatre, Brooklyn, while in conversation with ex-Senator Daggett, the Republican leader of Kings county, and other gentlemen. The arrest was made by Detective Stewart, of New York, upon a warrant issued by Judge Noah Davis, Federal Justice of the Supreme Court, which charges the prisoner with a malicious libel.

Philip and the officer, accompanied by Wm. Vecker, came over to police headquarters in this city. After a brief detention here he was taken to the Supreme Court. Judge Davis being temporarily absent he was detained in the District Attorney's office. He will be arraigned before Judge Davis later in the day.

Howard Philip was arrested at 5 o'clock this evening before Chief Justice Neal Davis, of the Supreme Court. His counsel, Gen. Roger A. Pryor, objected to the prosecution reading the affidavits on which the order of arrest was obtained, but the judge overruled the objection. District Attorney Bell then read an affidavit by Col. George Bliss, who testified that he examined a facsimile copy of the letter with others in his possession from Gen. Garfield, and pronounced it a forgery. That he compared a photographic copy of the letter with the writings of the accused, and on information and belief thought he was the author of it. Affidavits were also read by E. Payne and Albert P. Southworth, experts in handwriting, were read and were of similar purport. Attached to the affidavits was the original copy of an article for publication written by the accused. A warrant was then made to have the warrant dismissed on the ground that the affidavits were not strong enough to support it. The motion was denied by Judge Davis, who held that the publication of an article after its authenticity had been denied, which tended to bring odium on the supposed author, was a criminal libel. The examination was adjourned until 11 o'clock to-morrow morning, the prisoner furnishing \$5,000 bail to appear.

THE EPISCOPALIANS. LAST DAY'S SESSION OF THE GENERAL CONVENTION—RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED—AMENDMENTS TO THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER, &c.

NEW YORK, October 27.—The last day's session of the Protestant Episcopal General Convention opened in the House of Deputies on Canons reported a resolution declining to concur with the House of Bishops in changing the canon which relates to the reinstatement of clergymen who have abandoned the church. The resolution was adopted. Rev. Dr. Beers, of the Joint Committee on securing a Missionary Bishop for each Territory, reported in favor of the proposition. The report was adopted, together with a resolution appointing a committee of twenty-one to act as an auxiliary to the committee on the subject, and to create missionary bishoprics.

WASHINGTON, October 27.—The Superintendent of Railway Mail Service today wrote a letter to the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac Railroad Company, saying that if they establish steamboat service between Washington and Quantico and thereby increase the amount of time required in transit between Washington and Richmond, and if the Southern lines at Richmond or Northern lines at Washington break connection with this road, then it will be necessary to send the great Southern mails by some other route of routes.

Supervising General Hamilton, of the United States Marine Hospital Service, has just completed his annual report. It recommends the establishment of hospitals at Baltimore, New Orleans, Cairo, Vicksburg, Norfolk, Galveston, Savannah and Pittsburg. Special appropriations are also recommended for repairing and altering marine hospital buildings as follows: Key West, Fla., \$20,000; Mobile, Ala., \$10,000; and Wilmington, North Carolina, \$5,000.

KENTUCKY. THE MURDER OF P. H. TALBOTT—HIS WIFE AND CHILDREN ARRESTED FOR THE CRIME.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) ST. LOUIS, October 27.—About a month ago Dr. P. H. Talbott, a prominent citizen of Mayville, Missouri, and editor of the Greenback paper published at that place, was shot through the window of his residence and killed while he was retiring for the night. Yesterday his wife and children were arrested on the charge of committing the murder, and Mrs. Talbott, the Doctor's widow, and Ed. Talbott, another son, and a hired man named Whet, were also arrested as accessories. A preliminary examination is going on to day at Mayville.

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(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) NEW YORK, October 27.—A thirty years old coffee house, failed today, and made an assignment to Morgan S. O'Brien. They made only one preference and that to a twelve thousand dollar creditor. Their liabilities are about \$300,000, assets about \$400,000. The cause of the failure is shrinkage in the value of coffee held a long time, and out-of-town failures.
