THE ELECTION.

A DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY OF ONE IN THE U. S. SENATE-THE HOUSE RE-PUBLICAN - CALIFORNIA STILL IN DOUBT-THE NEW YORK MAYORALTY -OFFICIAL RETURNS FROM IOWA, ILLINOIS, ETC.

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] WASHINGTON, November 5.—A special to the Star from New York says: "It is admitted at Republican headquarters, that the Democrats will have a majority of one in the Senate.

"At Tammany Hall it is admitted the House will be Republican by a majority of ten to fifteen. There is some talk in this city in regard to the possibility that Mr. Dowd may yet be shown to be elected Mayor, and as the report spreads it creates considerable excitement. CALIFORNIA.

Ban Francisco, November 5-This morning's papers make the vote of California practically a tie. This change from last night's report is due less to any turn in the reports of precincts than to a revision of tabulated statements. These differ considerably, and there are evidences of loose work sufficient to discredit all estimates-Undoubtedly the estimate of 2,000 of last night was too high, and the best opinion seems to be that Garfield will have a plurality of from 500 to 1000.

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
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
