How It Works.

The Kinston Journal gives the following as the result of an experiment made by Henry Gray, in the use of guano manufactured at the Navassa Guano Works, near this city: "He used Navassa Guano, 200 pounds to the acre, with 20 bushels of cotton seed, and left two rows in the field not manured with anything. The two rows unmanured made 57 pounds of seed cotton, and the two rows adjoining, of same length, manured with the guano and cotton seed, made 97 pounds."
