Baptist State Convention Goldsboro Messenger-Extra.

SECOND DAY -MORNING SESSION. Convention opened at 9 o'clock with prayer by J. G. Dowell, who conducted the morning service, reading the 121st Psalm, Hymn, "A charge to keep." Prayer by Rev. R. H. Graves, of China.

The President announced the following committee on the work of the Home and Indian Board, viz: W. H. McIntosh, T. Harrison, Elias Dodson.

The hour having arrived, the report of the Sunday School Board, it being the special order of the morning, was taken up. The report was read and adopted.

We give a brief report: Number of schools in operation in 1879, 640; number of new schools organized this year, 50; whole number in operation this year, 650; number of attendants upon these 650 schools is estimated at 45.000. There are nearly 200 white Baptist churches this side of the Blue Ridge, which have no Sunday schools. N. B. Broughton, Esq., commented in a concise and forcible style on the report, and showed by his remarks extensive information and hearty zeal in the cause. Revs. Elias Dobson, J. B. Taylor, G. R. French and others made appropriate remarks. Rev. A. C. Dixon, in behalf of the Western Baptist Convention, extended a cordial invitation to the Sunday School Convention to meet with them in Asheville.

AFTERNON SESSION. The Convention was called to order by Vice President J. B. Taylor. Prayer by Elder J. J. Carroll.

The hour for the special order having arrived, the subject 'of Home Missions was taken up.

On motion the Board was allowed to make any amendment to the report they may see proper, after consulting with the missionaries present. New churches organized during the year, 31; whole number of churches in 1880, 767; communicants in these churches in 1879, 75,000; additions in 1883, 3,000; professed conversions under Baptist preaching in

the State in 1880, at least 5,000. The Board has received from al sources \$1,896 08; liabilities of the Board, \$1,742 62; leaving a balance in the treasury of \$153 46.

- The German barques Carl Max and Erner cleared from this port for Liverpool, yesterday, the former 1,159 and the latter with 2,458 bales of cotton, or an aggregate of 3,617 bales. Messrs. Williams & Mnr. chison were the shippers.

- The steamer D. Murchison arrived from Fayetteville late last evening, and was expected to discharge her cargo of cotton, etc., and start on the backward trip the same night. The boats now have plenty of water and they mean business.

- When the steamer D. Murchison left Favetteville there was about ten feet of water on the shoals. It had been falling off slightly, but just as the boat was about leaving it commenced rising again, and a freshet was pretty generally looked for.

-The Norwegian barque Polycarp, Capt. Jensolsen, which arrived here from Grimstadt, yesterday afternoon, consigned to Mr. C. P. Mebane, is a new and handsome craft of 498 tons burthen, having been launched in August. This beautiful vessel is named after Polycarp, one of the Apostolical Fathers of the Church who suffered martyrdom for his Christian principles in the year A. D. 166.

- Capt. Campbell, late of the British barque George Davis, having left that vessel, sailed on the steamship Gulf Stream for New York, where he will take passage for Liverpool, in which city he resides. He is succeeded in command of the George Davis by Capt. Maloid, also of Liverpool, who has already arrived and taken charge of the vessel. Capt. Campbell assumed charge of the barque on the death of Capt. Hooker, her former commander, at Smithville a year or two ago, under whom he had been previously serving as mate. - It is both pleasant and profitable for to mind and discuss matters and things connected with the past. It revives old memories and associations and often results in bringing to light some long forgotten but pleasant recollection that may serve for a season as an agreeable diversion in the midst of the toils and cares of the present. The question of the antecedents of the steamship Gulf Stream has stirred up our "antiquarians" to some extent, and, while not posted ourself, we take pleasure in giving the recollections of others more fortunate in this respect. Writing to us yesterday, one of these gentlemen, referring to the Gulf Stream, or North Carolina, as she was then called, says: "She was built for the New York and Wilmington Steamship Company, the bulk of the stock in which was owned here, and intended to ply between New York and Wilmington. She made only one or two trips, when the war came on and she was laid up here and remained for more than a year, being finally sold by the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Company-being the largest stockholder and representing the other owners-to Messrs. John Fraser & Co., of Charleston, who loaded her, principally with cotton, and dispatched her through the blockade (then very inefficient) early in 1862, to Liverpool, where she arrived safely and discharged her cargo. In the fall of 1862 she was loading at Liverpool with an assorted cargo, for Bermuda or Nassau, after which this 'deponent' lost sight of her. She ran the blockade out of this place under the command of Capt.
