Add 5,034 bales, and you have the receipts up to and including yesterday, the 9th inst., which makes the number 81,517. The receipts from the commencement of the cotton year to December 15th, 1879, footed up 62,874. Add the average of 773 bales for the six days from the 9th to the 15th of December, 1880, (which is 4,638) to the 81,517 bales time, and you have a total of 86,155 bales. Deduct the 62,864 bales received up to December 15th, 1879, and you will find the

average of 773 is made from the receipts for the nine days from the 1st to the 9th of December, 1880, inclusive, which was 6,958 bale.

The Laurinburg Fire.

The Enterprise, after depicting the scenes of confusion and destruction which characterized the progress of the conflagration in that place on Tuesday morning last, with no hooks, no ladders, no hose and no engines, to assist in arresting the spread of the devouring flames, continues:

"The fire continued with unabated fury until every business house and every dwell ing house on the east side of Trade street was burned to ashes, twenty-five buildings in all. The enclosure of the R. R. Company's shops took fire several times, but owing to prompt action and hard work the shops were saved, except the tin shop, which was torn down by order of the Master Machinist.

"The property destroyed is estimated to be worth about \$30,000, though no accurate estimate can be arrived at under present circumstances. Some have lost a portion of their stocks in the fire, and all have sustained a heavy loss in the derangement of goods removed.

'The fire originated in the rear part of the store of Mr. T. A. McDougald, and is supposed to have been the work of incen-"The damage to railroad property will

not amount to more than \$175. "The fire has not altogether suspended business; five stores and two liquor houses yet remain to supply the trade, namely: Nunn & McMillan, Fountain Brothers, who lost one store, Everett Brothers & Gill, A. T. Clark, McCaskill & McLean's drug store, and the liquor houses of H. F. Northrop. These houses are on the west side of Trade street, and although scorched badly, never burned. Work in the shops progresses as heretofore, and professional men move on

"The merchants whose stocks were damaged have all secured rooms in which to store their goods temporarily."
