

#### THE POPULATION.

We propose briefly to glance at some of the salient points of the census of 1880. North Carolina is the sixth in the list of percentage of increase among the Southern States. Arkansas, Florida, South Carolina, Texas and West Virginia all lead our State. The per centage of increase for North Carolina is 30.6 per cent. or 328,639. The average increase in the United States is 30.8. Texas shows an increase of 95.1. The total population is 50,152,559. This will be subject to change upon a revision of the returns. Every State and Territory shows some increase. The States north and east of the Potomac and Ohio do not come up to the general average throughout the country. In New England the in erease is very small. In Maine it is but 3.5 per cent; in New Hampshire it but 9.2; in Vermont, 9.5; in Connecti out, 16.8; in Massachusetts, 22.2. In the latter the increase is owing

mainly to the foreign element.

All the States and Territories in the South and those west of the Mississippi show a large increase. The total increase for ten years is 11,594, 188. A like increase during the next ten years will bring the population up to 67,000,000. The percentage of increase is not as great as it was before the war, when the average increase was 35 per cent. If Virginia had not been divided its population would have been 2,130,-396, which would have made her sixth in size. As it is she is fourteenth Texas has increased more in actual population than any other State, its increase being 778,930 Texas and Georgia and Missouri in the South alone exceed North Caroin increase. Georgia has increased 354,874 and Missouri 447,796. Maryland shows but little increase outside of Baltimore, the total for the entire State being 19.1. After Texas Pennsylvania shows the largest increase, namely, 760,787 or 21.3 per cent.; New York third, with 700,414 or 16 per cent.; Kansas fourth, with 625,936 or 169.4 per cent.; Illinois fifth, with 538,745 or 21.2 per cent.; Ohio sixth, with 533,-538 or 19.9 per cent. New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois-all being nearly in a line from the Atlantic to the Mississippi, contain 18,751,593 inhabitants. This will do for six States. The States that may be classed as Seaboard States have a population of 26,262,473. This includes, New England, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Missisother States have a population of 23,890,086, so the star of Empire still

We do not think it is practicable or desirable to have a State uniformity of school text books. In the North where the school system is far more advanced than it is in the South. there is a strong, growing sentiment of hostility to a general uniformity of text-books, as experiment shows that such uniformity throughout the State is very expensive, and in some instances inoperative and impracti-

Marshals have been selected mainly for their willingness to prostitute their official power to foment sectional strife, to oppress unoffending citizens and to pollute elections. Postmasters have been appointed who were utterly incompetent, in some instances being unable to read or write, merely because they were potential in demoraizing and controlling the ignorant blacks. Customs and revenue officers have been selected to make the collection of revenue secondary to the corrupt control of elections. United States Commissioners have united with District Attorneys and Marshals to plunder the government by the wanton vexation of struggling business interests in the South, and the special agencies of the government are crowded with noted criminals as rewards for noted political crimes.
