Local News.

Second Sunday after Epiphany. Cotton receipts yesterday 533 bales. Day's length 10 hours and 1 minute. Ice was plentiful yesterday morning. The cold wave reached here again Friday night. Turkeys 18 to 20 cents in our market yesterday. Eggs are selling again at from 30 to 35 cents per dozen. Full moon yesterday morning at 20 minutes after 6 o'clock. The storm-flag was again at the front at the Signal Station yesterday. Green pork was selling yesterday at from \$6 to \$8.50 per hundred. Capt. W. J. Potter represented Brunswick in the Prohibition convention. The American Union Telegraph pole-distributors are getting pretty close down this way. Remember the poor this cold weather, and send in your contributions to the Ladies' Benevolent Society. Last Monday was the fifteenth anniversary of Miss Amy Bradley's school, now known as Tilston Normal School. The only cases for the Mayor's consideration yesterday morning were a few for the non-payment of license taxes. A fine audience witnessed the rendition of "East Lynne" at Miss Ada Gray's matinee at the Opera House yesterday afternoon. The Register of Deeds issued six marriage licenses during the past week, of which two were for white and four for colored couples. The members of Stone wall Lodge No. 1, K. of P., are notified to attend an important meeting at Castle Hall to-morrow evening. Rev. J. J. Kelly, an Indian preacher, is announced to preach in the City Hall to-night, for the benefit of St. Stephen's A. M. E. church. Mr. Harry Johnson, one of the fortunate survivors of the recent serious disaster on the C. C. R. R., is in the city, entirely recovered from the effects of the accident. There were no interments in Oakdale and Bellevue Cemeteries during the week closing yesterday. In Pine Forest (colored) Cemetery there were two interments, both children. There are quite a number of timber rats now at our wharves, and the number will probably be largely increased this week, the owners taking advantage of the present swollen condition of the Cape Fear and its tributaries. A subscriber on Princess, between Fourth and Fifth streets, requests us to ask the man who has been borrowing his STAR nearly every morning for the past two months, to be so good as to return it hereafter when he gets through reading it. The joint committees of the Board of Aldermen and Board of County Commissioners, to take into consideration the importance of establishing, without delay, a public hospital in this city, will meet in the County Commissioners' room to-morrow evening, at 7 o'clock. A lady in indigent circumstances complained at the City Hall yesterday that she got an order for a load of wood and gave it to a drayman, and that he has never carried her the wood and refuses to surrender the order, while at home she had not so much as a stick of wood to make a fire for the benefit of herself and children. We are requested to state that the members and congregation of St. Stephen's A. M. E. Church, owing to the uncomfotableness of the Tabernacle, will worship at the City Hall to-day, Rev. J. H. A Sad Accident—Reported Loss of Life. It is reported that two young men, Messrs. Washington and James Aulry, of Bladen county, lost their lives on a timber raft, which was carried into Brunswick river from the Cape Fear, four miles above this city, about dusk Friday evening. There were five rafts in company coming down the Cape Fear, and all were carried into Brunswick river by the strong tide and a gale of wind blowing at the time. The men on four of the rafts managed to get ashore—several of them making narrow escapes from drowning in doing so; but the two young men mentioned remained on their raft and have not since been heard of, although it, with the other rafts which were abandoned, was found yesterday in the neighborhood of the jetties below this city.
