THE LEGISLATURE.

SENATE. SATURDAY, JANUARY 22, 1881. BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS were introduced as follows and referred to appropriate committees or otherwise disposed of:

Mr. Newland, to incorporate the Rutherfordton, Marion & Tennessee Railroad Company. Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Dorth, to enforce a tax of \$500 on all persons engaged in employing laborers to leave the State.

Mr. Scott, of New Hanover, to incorporate Clarendon Council, No. 67, American Legion of Honor.

Mr. Scott, of New Hanover, to incorporate the Clarendon Water Works Company. Committee on Corporations.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. PETITIONS were presented as follows: Mr. Boykin, from certain citizens of Sampson county asking prohibition, and one with regard to a church in Sampson county.

BILLS were presented as follows: Mr. Dann, to repeal chapter 154 of the laws of 1876-77, establishing Inferior Courts.

Mr. Hamner, to amend the charter of the Yanceyville and Danville Coal-field railroad.

On motion of Mr. Boykin the rules were suspended and House bill 151, providing for the erection of a hospital in Wilmington by the commissioners and aldermen, was put on its several readings and passed.

The rules were at the same time suspended for the purpose of putting House bill 286, providing for the consolidation of the Atlantic Coast railway with the Fayetteville & Florence railroad upon its several readings. The bill passed and was ordered to be engrossed.

The Speaker announced the following committees: House branch of the committee on the election of trustees of the University--Messrs. Manning, Carter, Toon, Bledsoe and Menden.

Additional members on the joint committee on the fish interests--Messrs. Sparrow, Snipes, Washburn, Gatling and Robbins.

Additional members of the joint committee on the apportionment and redistricting the State--Messrs. Day, Rowland, Glenn of Rockingham, Cooper and Lineback.

The Tarboro Southerner says it learns through a private letter that it is rumored at Washington that Hon. Samuel F. Phillips is to be tendered the place of Attorney-General in Garfield's cabinet.

Raleigh Visitor: The hop given at the Tarboro House last night by Mrs. Governor Jarvis, complimentary to Miss Kait, of South Carolina, was an occasion long to be remembered by all present.

Greensboro Patriot: The winter session of the University of North Carolina began on Monday the 20th of January. Two hundred students were in attendance.

New Bernian: The lumber mills in our city are seemingly in a very thrifty and flourishing condition. Some of them have been running night and day for many months.

Oxford Free Lance: Mrs. Lou Southernland died in Henderson on Saturday night last week, of pneumonia, in the 60th year of her age.

Rev. Mr. Ruple, Presbyterian, says in the Salisbury Watchman: The Lutheran church, in Rowan county, is composed chiefly, but not exclusively, of the descendants of those German settlers who began to occupy the county about 1745.

Weldon News: Major Hannon, a well known and worthy colored man of this place, was appointed a page in the House of Representatives when he was only twelve years of age.

Raleigh News-Observer: Master John S. McDonald, son of Col. J. A. McDonald, has connected himself with the Evening Star as part owner.

Goldboro Messenger: We agree fully with the Wilmington STAR that the constitution ought to be amended so as to allow the shad fish to be exempt from taxation for a specified time all property used in manufactures.

Statesville Landmark: There is a rumor, which prevails more extensively in the country than in town, to the effect that Dr. J. J. Mot is to be promoted and that Dr. J. G. Ramsay, of Rowan, is to succeed him as collector internal revenue for this district.

The pulpit of the Fifth Street Methodist Church was filled on Sunday evening by Rev. M. C. Turentine. Mr. Turentine is an aged minister of the Gospel and well known to our old citizens.

Yesterday morning the fleecy particles that go to make up the "beautiful snow" commenced falling here, at first in light profusion and with occasional intervals, but finally assuming the steady and uninterrupted proportions and appearance of a first class "down East" snow storm.

For the Oyster Trade. An oyster "barbip," built on a new and improved plan, is under construction at Capt. Skinner's shipyard for a Boston man, who is here awaiting its completion.

Three negro men were arrested in Abbotsville last Sunday afternoon, charged with piling crates on the railroad for the purpose of wrecking the western bound passenger train due at that place about 10 o'clock that night.

Toisnot Home: The Toisnot male and female school, which opened its 7th session on Thursday the 13th, with forty pupils, has increased this week to fifty-nine.

Public Meeting at Rocky Point. At a meeting of the Democratic voters and tax-payers of Rocky Point, on Saturday last, to consider the question of a special tax, Mr. W. B. Hocutt having been called to the chair, by Mr. W. F. Robitshch officiating as secretary, after some discussion by Mr. J. T. Bland and others, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted, viz:

Resolved, That we, the Democratic people, do enter our solemn protest against the levying of any such tax, as being unnecessary, onerous and wrong, as it appears from the reports of our finance committee and our various officials that our county debt is now less than \$5,000, and can be paid from the savings of our present taxes in less than two years.

Resolved, That we earnestly recommend for the position of magistrate in this township the name of James M. Westbrook, as one every way worthy and competent to fill such position, and earnestly solicit our representatives to secure his appointment for that position.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Wilmington papers with request to publish the same.

A Fine Sermon. The discourse of Rev. Dr. Wilson at the First Presbyterian church on Sunday morning, on James vi:10, contained much of "sweetness and light," but not as Matthew Arnold, who coined the phrases, understood them, for it contained the "sweetness and light" not of a vain and unsatisfying philosophy, but of the blessed Gospel of the Son of God.

Needham Dudley, colored, was sent to jail yesterday for nonpayment of costs in a case of assault and battery tried before Justice Mills.

Sandy Stewart, colored, was arrested yesterday on an alias capias, for the non-payment of costs in Justice Gardner's Court, and sent to jail.

J. H. Jones, colored, was arrested yesterday and sent to jail, in default of security, there to await trial at the February term of our Criminal Court on the charge of larceny.

Sudden Death. Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor, wife of Mr. Henry Taylor, residing on McRae, between Mulberry and Walnut streets, died quite suddenly on Sunday morning last.

The receipts of cotton for the week ending yesterday footed up 2,078 bales, as against 549 bales for the corresponding week last year, showing an increase of 1,429 bales for 1881.

Rev. Dr. Yates and Rev. Mr. Ricard, pastors respectively of the Front Street and Fifth Street Methodist churches, were "pounded" by their respective congregations during the past week.

The Cape Fear Club are having rooms fitted up in the building formerly occupied by Dr. T. B. Carr, over Mr. J. Habn's grocery store, and will move into their new quarters in a few days.

The new Congregationalist church on Nun, between Sixth and Seventh streets, is rapidly approaching completion, the steeple being up, and nearly enclosed. The body of the church is of brick.

Some of our citizens complain of annoyance from traps engaged in begging, who do not stop to knock at front doors, but frequently force their way into back lots and intrude upon the privacy of individuals.
