

Its only rival in this country is the North American Review A. S. Barnes & Co., New York, publishers. Scribner's Monthly for February is one of rare excellence. This popular American illustrated magazine has attained a very wide circulation. It now issues some 120,-000 cupies monthly. The London correspoodents of the New York Tribune and World write that the January number reached a sale in England greater than that of any of the famous British monthlies, ineluding Blackwood, Belgravia, London So ciety, and so on. This is very nuliceable. It has achieved its vast circulation by reason of its superior wood engravings and its popular matter. Every number contains two or three solid papers, some excellent fiction, and generally some very readable lighter articles. Now and then its editori-

The Supreme Court of the United States in the so-called Grauger cases decided that a State had the right to regulate and limit the charges of railroad companies. In these cases from lows and Wisconsin the bargain was that the companies might fix their own rates. But the Supreme Court of the United States held that a subsequent law to restrain them within reasonable limits was no violation of the contract. No State, it seems, can disarm itself of the power to proteot its citizens, any more than it can lawfully sell out and deliver up the entire population to sack and pillage. The unanswerable opinion of Chief Justice Waite, in Munn vs. State of Illinois (4 Otto 113), settles the question as to the constitutional power of restraining railroad corporations to reasonable and just obarges, from the fact that railroads are public highways, and when these corporations own the corpus of the road and use it in the business of a commou carrier, they may be compelled to behave themselves justly to all their customers, and submit to any regulation for the public good.



POLITICS IN THE SOUTH.

Senator Ben Hill, in the interview we referred to in Sunday's issue, told the reporter of the Philadelphia Press, a cantankerous organ of Stalwartism, that the Southern white people favor the appointing of negross to office when they are compatent. He said on this point:
