Section one of "An act for the Encouragement and Support of the State Guard." passed at the late session of the General Assembly, provides "That all officers, musicians and privates of the State Guard, who comply with all their military duties as prescribed by law, shall be exempt from all jury service of any character and description;" and there is also a provision for annual encampments.

RIVER AND MARINE.

- The Norwegian barque Credo, which arrived here from Liverpool yesterday reports very heavy weather on the voyage, during which the mizzenmast, topmast and sails were carried away. A survey has

been ordered. - Capt. Robeson, of the steamer Wave, reports the river quite low again, there being only about seven feet of water on the shoals. The state of the water has enabled those engaged in the effort to raise the sunken steamer Gov. Worth to perfect their arrangements to that end, and when the Wass passed the scene of the disaster on Wednesday the chain had all been gotten into position, and it was expected that she would be brought to the surface yesterday.

- Capt. Bremers, of the German barque Lydia Peschau, which arrived here from London yesterday, reports having experienced heavy weather nearly all the way. On Monday, the 14th inst., in the Gulf. Stream, about one hundred and eighty miles off the coast, the barque fell in with the Nova Scotian brig Flying Cloud, Capt. Kyffin, bound from Cienfuegos to New York, with a cargo of sugar, and in nearly a sinking condition. Capt. Kyffin asked Capt. Bremers to remain by him while he made an effort to reach Charleston, which Capt. B. promised to do, but soon afterwards it was found that the water was gaining so rapily upon the sinking vessel that she would have to be abandoned. Arrangements for the transfer of the officers and men was thereupon made, and Capt. Kyffin and his crew, eight in all, were soon on board of the Lydia Peschau, and were brought safely to this port. When Capt. Bremer first approached the unfortunate brig she had but six feet and four inches of water in her hold, and after remaining by her about the space of half an hour the soundings showed that it had increased in that short time to eight and a half feet. Capt. Kyffia, who is a resident of St. John's, N. B., reports that his vessel suddenly sprung a leak Sunday night. The Flying Cloud registered 235 tons. It is supposed
