The Amendments to the Coroner's

The recent amendatory legislation as to the duties of coroners provides, in a bill passed first and separately, that the number of the coroner's jury shall be reduced from twelve to six, and that the six shall be paid for their services as other jurymen. Coroner's jurymen have heretofore received no remuneration. A second bill passed provides that the coroner shall not be required to hold an inquest unless an affidavit is filed with the coroner or a magistrate that there was probably foul play in the death. The bill further provides that the jury, and not the coroner, shall summon a physician for
