CONGRESS—THIRD SESSION.

PRESENTATION OF FLORAL TRIBUTES TO SENATORS KELLOGG AND HILL. THE LATTER FROM THE LADIES OF ALEXANDRIA FOR HIS DEFENSE OF THE HONOR OF VIRGINIA—NO PROGRESS MADE IN BUSINESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—The Senate met this morning a handsome bouquet of flowers adorned Senator Kellogg's desk, while a magnificent floral ship, sailing upon a sea of violets and roses, the gift of the ladies of Alexandria, Va., to Senator Hill, of Georgia, ornamented that gentleman's desk and was greatly admired.

On motion of Mr. Cameron, of Wisconsin, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Secretary of the Senate to pay from the contingent fund the necessary funeral expenses of the late Senator Carpenter.

The pending business, being the resolution for the election of officers of the Senate, was then taken up.

A motion to go into executive session was rejected—yeas 35, nays 35.

The floral tributes which adorned Senator Hill's desk to-day was accompanied with the following address:

These Virginia flowers, from the ladies of Alexandria, are presented to Senator Hill, of Georgia, as a tribute to the brilliant manner in which he recently exposed the corrupt bargain made by a Senator from Virginia on the one part, and the Republican party on the other.

Mr. Hill, of Georgia, read a letter issued from the Roman journal on the 10th of October, 1880, by Wm. Mahone, in which he alluded to the Republican party as the "grip-sack" party.
