As act to establish a public road through the State's land and to improve the same. Provides for laying out a road through the public lands in Craven and Jones counties.
As act to supply the North Caro-

na Insane Asylum with pure water. An act to make dogs listed for tax-ation the subject of larceny. Provides that dogs listed shall be the subject of larceny. The tax shall be one dollar, to be applied to the com-mon school fund. Ratified March 11. An act to incorporate the Bank of Enfield. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend section 1, chapter 70, Battle's Revisal. Relates to enticing servants from employers. Ratified March 11.

An act to facilitate the settlement of executors and administrators and guardians. This act allows the administrator, &c., to pay to the Judge of Probate moneye, &c., belonging to legatees and contributees, and for administrators or guardians to turn in assets to the Judge of Probate. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend chapter 34, section 1, laws of 1873 and 1874. This act refers to the marshal of the Supreme Court, changing his salary from \$2 per diem to \$500 per annum, payable monthly.

An act to amend the laws prescribing the duties of coroners. Prescribes that it shall not be requisite to hold an inquest without probable cause. Ratified March 11.

An act to amend the charter of the town of Mount Olive, in Wayne

An act to amend section 2, chapter 126. Battle's Revisal. This act makes the amount of bonds to be given by the commissioner of wrecks \$4,000. Ratified March 11.

An act to allow the county commissioners to place the names of school committemen in the jury box. Ratified March 11.
