WALHINGTON.

HANGES IN THE COMMAND OF THE NAVAL FORCES-TER FARRAGUT STATUE UNVEILED.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) Wasseinstron, April 24.—Rear Admiral C. R. Rodgers has been ordered to relieve Admiral George B. Balch as superintendent Admiral George B. Balch as superintendent of the Naval Academy, June 18th. Admiral Balch will then proceed to San Francisco and take command of the naval force on the Pacific Station. Commodors I. H. Shots has been ordered to Washington for examination for promotion to the grade of Rear Admiral. He is to take command of the saval force on the South Atlantic Station, in place of Rear Admiral Bryson, who has applied to be relieved.

Washington, April 35.—The statue of Admiral David G. Farragut, recently creeted in Farragut Square at the intersection of Connecticut Avenue and Seventeenth street, was unveiled this afternoon

with appropriate ceremonies.
At 13:35 the Presidential party arrived at the statue, and soon after the ceremony of unveiling took place. At the moment of unveiling a salute of seventeen guns was fired. President Garfield soon appeared ipon the speaker's stand and in a few words paid an eloquent tribute to the hero whose statue had just been unveiled. Ex-Postmaster General Maynard then delivered a lengthy oration on the life and services of Admirai Farragut. He was followed by Senator Voorbees, of Indiana, who also pent's splendid tribute to the dead Admirai. At the conclusion of Senator Voorhees', oration the procession reformed, entered the grounds of the Executive Mansion, passed in review before President Garffeld, and then dispersed.

WESSONS, THE WIFE-MURDERER, RE-SISTS ARREST AND IS KILLED-NEW RAILBOAD TO BE SUILT-THREAT-ENED RAILEGAD TROUBLES AT WACO. [By Tulegraph to the Morning Star.]

GALVESTON, April 24 -The News has the Gentlings, Tanas, April 33. - Sheriff Brown and a posse of men, who went in pursuit of Wessons, who shot his wife and a neighbor named Henson, reached Wessons' premises, and after a fruitless search Wessons appeared from a barn. He refused to surrender, and opened fire on Brown and his posse with a shot-gun and a six-shooter, wounded, with five shots in his body. THE LAND LEAGUE.

THE SITUATION IN IBELAND AS GIVEN BY A GENTLEMAN FROM THAT COUN-

(By Twingraph to the Morning Star.) NEW YORK, April 34. - At a Land League meeting in Brooklyn to-day Patrick Rodgers, a gentleman recently from Ireland, who is well acquainted with the officers of the League in that country, read a speech which he had prepared on the subject. He said he knew from personal observation that the Land League is flourishing in Ireland, and that the people are united in a determination to resist all exorbitant demands for rent. The people must have the sinews of war. If they can obtain moral and material senistance from America, and that is the land they mainly rely upon, they will succeed. Mr. Rodgers further said the irishmen had been instrumental in bringing the Liberal Ministry into power, and yet the Ministry which had been so deeply trusted had brought in a Coercion bill. He argued that it was useless for Irish to attempt violence, sa there are 45,000 soldiers, not to mention the police, in various parts

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

(By Cable to the Morning Star.) COMPTANTIMOPLE, April 24.—Dervisch Pasha has entered Prisrend. The Albanian League has been dissolved and has now en-

tirely ceased to exist. Tunia, April 24.—The apprehensions of the foreign residents were exaggerated in consequence of the Bey's statement that he would be unable to guarantee safety to Europeans, in the event of French troops crossing the Tunisian frontier. M. Roustan, French Consul General, has declared that he would himself avow for their safety, and would offer an asylum on board of the French gun-boat to all fearing for their

LONDON, April 25.—A special train bearing Lord Beaconsfield's body, left Paddington station for Wycombe at 2,30 Sunday morning, and on the arrival of the train at Wycombe the remains were transferred to Hugenden Manor and placed in the large drawing room. Owing to the secreey of the proceedings only about thirty persons witnessed the departure of the hearse from Curzon street, and nobody witnessed its arrival at Wycombe.

Tunis, April 25.-The French Consul General here has sent a circular to the other foreign consuls, stating that he has offered the Bey to place at his disposal a company of marines and two cannon from a French man-of-war for the purpose of maintaining order in the European quarters of the city,

and that the Bey has declined the offer. BERLIN, April 25 .- A correspondent at Paris says there is no prospect of the suc-cess of the Monetary Conference, and in view of the present attitude of the Powers decision to postpone or even close deliberations may be expected shortly.

LONDON, April 23 .- An Athens correspondent says: The irritation against the povernment, though kept down, is unmistakable. The Minister of War was so deeply impressed by the indignation of the army that he instructed the second reply should demand the session of Elassons and Prevesa, and on the Cabinet's refusal of his preposal he resigned. The second reply, therefore, will not take a different ground from the first-demanding the immediate occupation of Thessaly and the same provision for Epirus will be more urgently requested. Should the Albanian movement develop into a regular war, Greece must intervene to prevent Epirus from drifting into the Albanian League. In that case war would be inevitable, whether the proposals of the Powers are accepted

Another correspondent says: Either the government is playing a deep game with its own people or Greece is on the brink of war. The main point in the Greek note, which will be printed this week, will be its calling the attention of the Powers to the fact that they had not replied to the reservations contained in the Greek note of the

It is understood that Sir Stafford Northcote will preside at the meeting of the Conservatives on Wednesday next. It is believed that the Conservative leadership lies between Sir Stafford Northcote and the Duke of Richmond.

The House of Commons reassembled today. Lord Richard Grosvenor, Liberal, announced that Mr. Gladstone would a fortnight hence move a vote for funds to erect a monument in honor of Lord Beaconsfield, in the vicinity of Westminster. The announcement was received with

This evening debate on the second read-ing of the Land bill was discussed. In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Forster, replying to Mr. Lewis, said it was true that a disgused perty bad made a raid for fire-arms in county Limerick, in the name of the Just Republic, and he was sorry to say that no arrests had been made for, as in many other cases, it was impossible to get information or assistance from

SOUTH AMBRICA.

THE SITUATION IN PERU-CONFUSION AND ANARCHY STILL PREVALENT-CHILIAN OCCUPATION TO BE PRO-

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] PANAMA, April 25 .- Dates from Lima are to the 7th inst. The situation of affairs in the city and in the central provinces is more tranquil. In the North and South, however, new elements of confusion and anarchy have arisen. Montero and Satar have declared in favor of Pirola's Government, and denounce as traitors worthy of death all persons who are disposed to make peace with Chili. It is probable that the Chilian occupation will be a thing of years instead of months, and will soon be extended to every part of Peru. Minister Vagara has gone to Chill to consult with his Government. He is known to be thoroughly disgusted with the condition of affairs, and sees no remedy but annexation.

What is to be the light of the future is not yet determined. There is an announcement that already Edison is eclipsed and Brush's latest improvements surpassed. It is to uti lize the oxygen of the air. A citizen of Forest City, Ohio, has obtained letters patent for a new method of lighting and heating. The inventor is Edward B. Reynolds, an Englishman. A special from Cleveland, Ohio, to the Philadelphia Press, thus tells how it operates:

"The device consists simply of an ordinary air-tight cylinder, into which is introduced a paste compound of certain proportions of gasoine and powdered charcoal, on top of which is packed tightly some fibrous material, like cotton. Through a pipe in one end of this cylinder is forced atmospheric air, subjected to a greater or less degree of compression, according as heat or light is desired, and the product that results from this combination under this condition is led from the other end of the cylinder into a receiver, with which pipes are connected, which convey the air just as coal-gas now is, and may be burned in a similar manner.
