State Prohibition Convention. Raleigh Record's Report

The Convention assembled at Tucker Hall yesterday morning, according to adjournment, and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the President. Col. Thomas, of Charlette, made a brief address. On motion, a committee, consisting of Messrs. McNeil of Richmond, Gudger of Wake, and Montgomery of Cabarrus, was appointed to wait on ex-Senator Merrimon and request him to address the Convention. Dr. Satchwell, President of the State Board of Health, was introduced and discussed the effects of alcohol on the health of the consumer from a medical standpoint. Gov. Jarvis here entered the hall and, amid cheers, ascended the platform and assured the assemblage that he was in hearty sympathy with the cause. Judge A. C. Avery made a few remarks, identifying himself with the Prohibition movement. Judge Merrimon then made his appearance and, amidst the almost uproarious applause of the audience, ascended the stage. Lack of space forbids us to attempt a synopsis even of this eloquent and effective speech. At times the applause was so great that the speaker was compelled to suspend his remarks until order could

At the afternoon session Rev. J Mahoney made a speech, as did E. R. Dudley, of Craven. Various reeolutions of thanks were adopted, and after a graceful speech from the President, Hon. J. C. McRae, the convention adjourned sine die, with the understanding that a great mass meeting was to be held at night. So at 8 o'clock a large crowd assembled in the hall. After the meeting was called to order, and a telegram read from the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina, speeches were delivered by Rev. Isham Cox, Col. Walter Montgomery, Rev. R. N. Price, Geo. H. White, col., and Rev. T. D. Swindell of Kinston.
