oblivion the names and graves of the gallant Confederates who are buried in Oakdale Cemetery." The following ladies were elected members of the Association : Mrs. Julia E. Mrs. Jane Stevenson, Mrs. Champ Davis, Mrs. Anna H. VanSickle, Mrs. C. Fulton, Mrs. Joseph Russell. On Saturday afternoon, July 21st, the day after the organization of the Association,

the officers, accompanied by many others, repaired to Oakdale, with floral decorations for the graves of the Confederate dead, there resting in a portion of the cemetery used as a public burial place. An address was delivered by Major Joseph A. Engelhard, and prayer was offered by Rev. Geo. Patterson. In 1887 there was no observance of the day, because of the fact that the remains

of the Confederate dead were in process of removal from the public burial ground to the lot generously donated to the use of the Association by the Oakdale Cemetery Company. At the regular annual meeting, held May 1st, 1873, Mrs. Julia E. Oakley, having

achieved the object so near to her heart. resigned the position of President of the Association, and Mrs. Dr. E. A. Anderson was elected to fill the vacancy. On May 1st, 1876, Mrs. Dr. Anderson resigned, and Mrs. C. D. Myers was elected Presi dent, who held the responsible position until the annual meeting in 1878, when she resigned, and was succeeded by Miss Hettie James. The present officers of the Association are as follows : President, Miss Hettie James ; Vice President, Mrs. Armand L.

DeRosset ; Treasurer, Mrs. Dr. Anderson ; Secretary, Miss Kate Burr. FORMER CELEBRATIONS IN REGULAR ORDER. The next annual celebration was in 1868. May 10th coming on Sunday, the preceding day (Saturday) was observed. The exercises

were opened with prayer by Rev. A. Paul Repiton, and after the prayer, which "moved many of its hearers to tears," the ladies, with tearful hearts and loving hands. proceeded to decorate most beautifully the Memorial lot.

On Monday, May 10th, 1869, Rev. George Patterson opened the ceremonies with prayer, after which Col. Robert H. Cowan spoke, relating with much pathos the noble part the Southern heroes enacted in the late war, and defending the course of the brave men among whose graves he stood. The hymn, "Soldiers of Christ" was then

sung, after which the ladies decorated the graves. On Wednesday, May 10th, 1870, Col. W. L. DeRosset officiated as Chief Marshal, Gen. R. E. Colston as Orator and Rev. J.

Thomas Childs DeRosset, fired a salute. who had but lately assumed command of

the Whiting Rifles, was stricken with paralysis on the grounds, which resulted in death in just one week, almost to a minute.

Saturday, May 10th, 1879, the late Col. Henry G. Flanner was the Chief Marshal, Rev. Dr. G. D. Bernheim acted as Chaplain and the address was delivered by Oapt. J. N. Maffitt, one of the naval heroes

of the late Confederacy, and a resident of Wrightsville Sound, in this county. The military display was finer than usual.

In 1880 the day for the observance of the usual custom of decorating the graves of the soldiers was changed by the Association to April 26th, the anniversary of the surrender of Gen. Joseph E. Johnston at Greensboro' (but which change it has since been decided to dispense with on account of the recent act of the Legislature making the 10th of May a legal holiday). Monday, April 26th, was therefore observed. Mr. J. C. Stevenson acted as Chief Marshal, Rev. Dr. E. A. Yates, of the Front Street M. E. church, officiated as Chaplain, and Major Graham Daves delivared the address.

street at 3:30 o'clock, in accordance with the programme, under direction of Major James Reilly, Chief Marshal, ably seconded by his Assistant Marshals, of whom Messrs. Walter. G. MacRae, A. D. Brown and John G. Darden had charge of the First Division, consisting of Brig. Gen. M. P. Taylor and staff and Artillery staff, Wilmington Cornet Concert Club, Wilmington Light Infantry, carriage containing Chaplain and Orator, Ladies' Memorial Association, Children's Memorial Association, and schools in charge of their teachers: Messrs. THE DECORATIONS.

The mound in the Confederate lot was Northern through and way beautifully and tastefully decorated, and Raleigh. Mails for the N. C. Railroad, many floral offerings to individual friends and kindred were deposited thereon, this feature of the ceremonies on this occasion being performed before the arrival of the Southern mails for all points procession.

Among the decorations we noticed the words "Pax Vobiscum" (Peace be with you), tastefully arranged in flowers on the west side of the mound; and on the east side the inscription "They Sleep-The Men we Love." There was also a banner bearing the inscription on one side "Ladies Memorial Association," and on the reverse "The Confederate Dead." These were placed there by the Association. In addition we noticed a banner, contributed by Miss Hart's school, bearing the inscription "T'will Live in Song and Story;" and one by the Children's Memorial Association, with the inscription on one side "To the Unknown' Dead," and on the reverse a handsome battle flag.

The Chief Marshal and his assistants des serve much credit for the perfectness which characterized all their arrangements. The choir was highly complimented for its beautiful singing, which was a very attractive feature of the occasion.
