M. R. A. CHASE HAS THE HONOR TO ANNOUNCE a representation of THE BEAUTIFUL ROMANTIC JUVENILE OPERA OF Golden Hair and the 3 Bears.

The Rev. Mr. Hughes for the committee appointed to consider the appointment of two evangelists, reported the following resolutions: That the Bishop be requested to appoint two evangelists, to be paid out of the Episcopal and contingent fund, that the evangelists be directed to take up collections whenever advisable for the Episcopal and contingent fund, and that the Bishop have the power, by and with the consent of the executive missionary committee, to re-establish the assessment for diocesan missions.

These resolutions, with an amendment to the second, offered by Dr. A. J. DeRoset, adding "unless otherwise ordered by the Bishop," were unanimously carried.

Evening Session. The Rev. Dr. Watson submitted the report of the standing committee; also a resolution recommending to the committee on canons a change in the canons, so as to provide for four annual meetings of the standing committee, which was carried.

The committee appointed to consider the statement of Mr. Wilkes reported a resolution exonerating him which was adopted.

Mr. R. H. Smith, for the committee on assessments, reported a resolution that the assessments remain unchanged, which was adopted.

Rev. A. S. Smith, for the committee to whom was referred that part of the Bishop's address pertaining to the subject of temperance, reported a resolution favoring the establishment of a temperance society similar to the one in the Church of England. The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Israel Harding, for the committee appointed to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Rev. Edward Geer, submitted a series of resolutions, which were adopted.

Mr. R. H. Smith offered a resolution that a committee of three legal gentlemen be appointed to examine into the title of all property held by the Church in the diocese, and submit a report on the second day of the next Convention. The resolution was adopted.

Upon motion of Dr. A. J. DeRoset, the time of meeting of the next Convention was fixed for the Wednesday following the fourth Sunday after Easter.

The communication on the proposed changes on the Book of Common Prayer asked to be continued till next Convention, which was granted.

An invitation from the congregation of Calvary church, Tarboro, was here extended the Convention to hold the next annual Convention at that place.

Upon motion, the invitation was accepted. Upon motion, the Convention proceeded to the election of trustees of the University of the South, resulting in the election of the following: Rev. George Patterson, D. D., Silas McBoe, Esq., and Gen. W. R. Cox. Dr. DeRoset declined re-election.

Local News. Fifth Sunday after Easter. Receipts of cotton yesterday 54 bales. Day's length 14 hours and 14 minutes. Capt. W. S. Norment was in the city yesterday. No cases for the Mayor's Court yesterday morning.

The brick store corner of Front and Dock streets is in process of erection. The first blackberries of the season were in market yesterday, and sold at 15 cents per quart. Eggs were selling yesterday at 12 1/2 to 15 cents per dozen; and spring chickens at 25 to 30 cents apiece.

Rev. T. D. Pitts, of St. John's church, will preach at St. Mark's church (Sunday) evening, at 5 o'clock, D. V. The following are the indications for the South Atlantic States to-day: Easterly to southerly winds, partly cloudy weather, with local rains in the southern portion, and slight rise in barometer and nearly stationary temperature.

Strange and Unprovoked Proceedings. A party of gentlemen were standing in front of a store on North Water street, near the corner of Princess, yesterday afternoon, engaged in a conversation, when one of the gentlemen noticed that a colored individual had taken up a position immediately in front of him and was gazing with an impudent stare into his face. He asked the colored party if he wanted to see him, and the man, who proved to be one Geo. Green, said rather pertly, that he did not. "Don't stand and stare me in the face in that way, then," remarked the gentlemen. Upon which, after hesitating a minute or two, during which the conversation between the party of gentlemen was resumed, Green suddenly blurted out the words, "my eyes are my own and I will look where I please!" Other words were passed, when Green suddenly assumed a fighting attitude and struck at the gentlemen, whereupon a scuffle ensued, during which the latter received two blows and Green one pretty severe one, when they were separated by Officer Bryan, who took Green into custody and conveyed him to the guard house. The conduct of Green, we are informed, was entirely unprovoked, as the gentleman whom he insulted did not even know him. If he had been intoxicated there might have been some excuse for him, but he did not appear to have been under the influence of liquor.
