## CURRENT COMMENT.

— Since the Senators of the Free State invited the judgment of the American people by resigning their seats, many have been inquiring into the alleged "guiltiness" of Mr. Ostling as a public man, and asking of what it consists and how it has been exhibited. Those who attempt to recall where and when he has displayed the qualities of statesmanship have difficulty in finding a single occasion. The purposes of statesmanship are the advancement of the country and the achievement of goals which the Nation has selected. Men are but agents, and their legitimate ambition can best be satisfied by their success as agents. Parties are but means, and are useful only when they are subservient to the national purposes that are to be accomplished. We have plenty of politicians, but statesmen are scarce. — The *Wilmington Star* suggests the celebration of the three-hundredth anniversary of the settlement of Roanoke Island, N.C., the oldest English settlement on the continent. This event occurs in June, 1585, the settlement of the Island having been made in June, 1584. By all means let the event be celebrated. It should not be permitted to pass unnoticed. North Carolina always takes pride in celebrating the Mecklenburg declaration. She should take a like interest in the celebration of its settlement. There are three years in which to work up interest in the affair, and we are sure that the press of Eastern North Carolina in particular, and of the State in general, will seek to arouse such an interest as to secure a successful celebration. Three Great Racing Events.  
Saturday, May 29.—Three sensational races are announced for the Chicago Driving Park Association. The first will be a special purse for Maud St. and St. Julian, and Sorrel Dan, the pacer. It will also be free for all others with records better than 2:14. Each horse which in three heats makes one in better time than 2:14 will receive \$1,500; the horse making the fastest average three heats, \$1,000, and each horse making a race better time than 2:10 3-4, \$100. These events are booked for June 21, the horses to go one at a time. The second purse, \$1,000, will go to the double team trotting the fastest mile to wagon during the meeting provided the time is faster than 2:23, Vanderbilt's time. The third purse, \$1,000, will be paid to the horses trotting the fastest two-mile of the meeting; provided it beats 4:44, Steve Maxwell's time.
