JOINT MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND THE BOARD OF MAGISTRATES - ELECTION OF A COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, ETC...
A joint meeting of the Board of Magistrates and the Board of County Commissioners of New Hanover county...

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session at the City Hall last night...
The matter of uniforms for the police force the Finance committee was granted further time...

The report of the committee on Police, recommending the reappointment of the police force, was adopted...
The Sanitary committee was granted further time...

The petition of certain butchers, regarding the weighing of beef cattle, reported adversely from the committee, was disproved, being contrary to law...
The Clerk and Treasurer and Tax Collector presented his official bond - \$29,000 - with O. G. Parsley, Z. Latimer and E. B. Burgess as sureties...

A communication from the Board of Audit and Finance was received, naming Messrs. Norwood Giles and R. J. Jones of the committee to act with the Finance Committee of the Board to examine and destroy bonds and coupons that have been paid and cancelled...
Petitions of D. Steiges and J. W. Hewlett to erect wooden buildings were granted...

The report of the Finance committee, recommending that a tax of five dollars per month be levied on each stovetop making contracts for loading or discharging vessels, was adopted...
Reports from the Chief of the Fire Department and the Superintendent of Health were read and accepted...

Petition from J. C. Lumsden, C. M. Harris and S. Jewett, asking for a modification of the Seaday law, was not granted...
Bids for painting rooms of the City Hall building were referred to the committee on Public Buildings, with power to act...
Bid of George Honnett, to repair and keep in order the city clock, was referred to a special committee...

Mr. Chairman Bagg, of the Board of County Commissioners, explained the action of the Board in reference to the dividing line between the lands of J. F. Garrell and those of the county, and read an order in reference thereto, and on motion the action of the Board was endorsed and confirmed...
Mr. Chairman Bagg asked the concurrence of the Board of Magistrates in a proposition of the Board of Commissioners to have tin roofs placed upon the buildings connected with the County Poor House...

Mr. Chairman Bagg next invited the attention of the meeting to a proposition of the County Commissioners to build another wing to the County Court House, similar to the one now attached to that building, including a free-proof room for records, with iron shutters, joists, girders, etc., and a room for the Clerk of the Criminal Court...

After some discussion it was moved and carried that the Board of County Commissioners be authorized to have the work done...
Mr. Chairman Bagg then extended an invitation to the members of the Board of Magistrates to visit the County Poor House, intimating that it would be a pleasure to them to note the many improvements which have taken place there recently...

Charles Stanley and Thomas Hayes, two white men and strangers in the city, were arrested yesterday, by Officer Schantz, of the police force, charged with picking the pockets of Mr. S. R. Robbins...
The case was turned over to a Justice of the Peace, who had the accused before him and required them to give bond in the sum of \$50 each for their appearance before him...

An anti-prohibition meeting was held at Liberty, Columbus county, June 5th. Mr. C. H. Cline was elected President, with the Vice-Presidents: J. L. Powell, A. M. Gore, Rev. P. Blackman, Rev. McClannan, Wright and A. Fowler...
