successful in her two selections from Shakespeare as in the other recitations which were mainly of a comic and amusing character. It is a very difficult role to assume to undertake scenes or passages even from the great dramatist. We think young artists should avoid the greatest and most difficult of all dramatic writers. If we were to name what appeared to us the most successful and felicitous of our gifted young lady's recitations, we should select "Widow Bedott's Poitry." which was given very amusingly and with a happy appreciation of the character in hand, and Tennyson's recent poem "Rizpah." This was the triumph of the evening, according to our judgment, and was rendered with much spirit and effectives ness, revealing more of dramatic power than anything she had done. Other pieces were presented in a pleasing and entertaining manner. She was often applauded and two futile efforts were made to bring her before the curtain.
