The address of ex-Gov. Holden before the Press Convention on "Journalism in North Carolina." is an instructive performance. Its value consists in its sketch of the oldest editors and the first papers published in the State. Hunter delivered an address at the First Baptist church last night on the importance of the religious instruction of the young. Hunter, better known as "The Children's Friend," will deliver an address on temperance, at the old market house stand, corner of Front and Market streets, this evening, at 8 o'clock. Found Dead - Inquest. At Rocky Run, about nine miles from this city, at or near Mr. D. S. Stephens' place, a colored child named Harrison Armstrong, was found dead by its parents on Friday evening last. It seems that the father and mother of the child went to work in the field and left the little one at home. In the evening they returned to their house and found the child stiff and cold in death. The remains were interred on the following Sunday afternoon, and on Wednesday a colored woman named Amanda Devane notified Coroner Hewlett of the death and inquest was held to the effect that information came to her knowledge which led her to believe that the child had been the victim of foul play. Upon this affidavit Coroner Hewlett summoned a jury and proceeded to disinter the corpse and hold an inquest in accordance with law. There was no inquest or other indication on the body to show that any violence had been used, though it was in such a state of decomposition that it was difficult to arrive at any definite conclusion about the matter. After a careful investigation, however, the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to her death from some cause which is unknown. Amanda Devane, who made the affidavit, is a half sister of the child, and lives in Wilmington. Deceased was between 6 and 7 years of age. A supposed Heist. It is reported, with what degree of truth we cannot say, that during a row which occurred in the 4th of July, a young colored man was knocked down twice, first with a brick bat and afterwards with a brick and then finally, in the midst of a struggle in which a large number congregated, he was severely cut; that he was subsequently taken to his home somewhere on Wall street and placed in bed, and died until some time during the following week, when he died of his injuries and was buried. We give the report as we hear it, with the understanding that it is to be investigated by the proper authorities to institute some investigation into the matter.

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
