As it is, they have a further respite. Meanwhile, the venerable ex-Governor Morgan comes to the front again as a proper man for the Treasury Department. Wall street and Exchange places are warmly supporting him, and, it is believed that the ex-Governor is perfectly willing to accept; but the President does not see his way very clearly as yet to the propriety of his appointment until Postmaster James retires.
