— To-morrow the second of the fall months steps down and out, and yet we have had but little fall weather.

— The Register of Deeds issued only two marriage licenses during the past week, one for a white and one for a colored couple.

— Prof. Agostini will open a dancing school in this city this week. The location of the school will be announced in Tuesday's Star.

— The eagerness with which Confederate bonds are sought after here, as well as elsewhere, is a matter of surprise to the uninitiated, one of whom we are which.

— The U. S. District Court for the District of the Cape Fear, Hon. G. W. Brooks presiding, will meet in this city to-morrow. The jurors are summoned to appear on Tuesday.

— We are glad to learn that Mr. J. W. Reilly's condition has greatly improved, though he is still very sore from the effects of the trying ordeal through which he passed.

— The steamers North State and Bladen were both at their wharves yesterday, but left during the afternoon, the former for Whitehall and the latter for Elizabethtown, or further if possible.

— A colored man, a stranger in the city, who claims New York as his home, fell in a fit on the streets yesterday and was taken to the station house, but soon recovered and went about his business.

— The Norwegian barque Brakka, Capt. Nielsen, was cleared from this port for Liverpool, yesterday, by Messrs. Sprunt & Son, with 1,978 bales of cotton, weighing 600,249 pounds and valued at \$68,900.

— The City and County Hospital, under the charge of W. W. Lane, located at what was formerly known as the Wilmington Gardens, will be open for the reception of patients on Tuesday, the 1st of November.

— Several of our citizens had a peep at the two pieces of artillery captured by Washington with Cornwallis at Yorktown, and now the property of the Chatham Artillery, of Savannah, as they passed through early in the week.

— Rev. W. W. Colley, the returned Baptist missionary, who has been lecturing in several of the city churches during the past week, will preach at the Chestnut Street (colored) Presbyterian Church to-day at 11 o'clock a. m., and at the First (colored) Baptist church at 7 o'clock p. m.
