Third Week - Great Pressure to Obtain Admission to Court Room - Mrs. Scoville and Other Witnesses Examined - Guiteau Goes for the Newspaper - The Court in a Stagnant Position - (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

WASHINGTON, November 28.—The third week of the Guiteau trial opened bright and sunny, and the attendance in the court room was as large as that of any previous day. The Marshal delivered his daily report to the audience and requested that the same order be observed as would be in church. Mr. Scoville and his coadjutors, Chas. H. Reid and J. W. Guiteau, were early in their seats, but counsel for the prosecution did not enter the room until several minutes after 10 o'clock.
