and the pang of jealousy, he is only con-scious of a wretched sense of coming ill which involves disgrace to Cassio, and somehow mysteriously concerns his wife; and, in his next speech, he expresses his full confidence in her. It is not till *Iago* has named *Desdemona*, and bid Othello observe his wife with Cassio that Signor Rossi allows the Moor to show the beginning of distrust by his wife. This is carrying a fine idea very far.

"Directly after, he rushes upon Iago, prostrates him, seizes him by the throat and pours out the wild wrath of his demand for proof, while furiously shaking Iago's head between his hands, his own moving at the same time with the action of a very savage, then spurning the prostrate wretch with his knee, recoils from him, rises quivering in every joint, draws his hand with a quivering motion over his brow and eyes as if he could neither see nor think, and finally staggers to a seat. It is all wonderful in its power and consistency.
